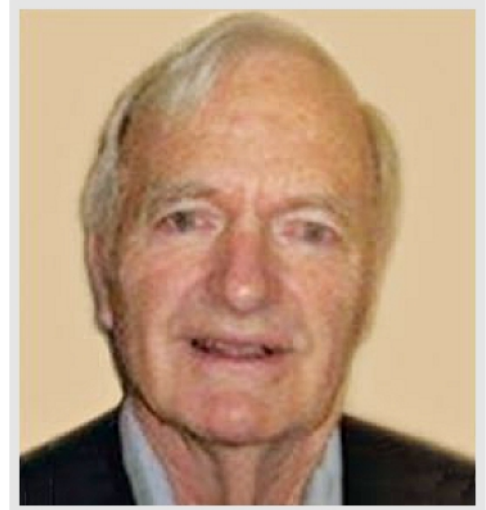




Barrett Worthington

Barrett Worthington, a lifelong resident of the Seattle area, passed away peacefully on May 19, 2024, at the age of 84. Born in Seattle in 1939, Barrett grew up locally, attending Seward School and achieving the rank of Eagle Scout before graduating from Edmonds High School. He then went on to



Whitman College, earning a degree in economics. Barrett later received his MBA from the University of Washington. It was during his time at Whitman College that Barrett met his life partner, Mary Duncan Worthington. The two were married and settled in Seattle, where they raised their two sons, Todd and Kent.

Barrett had a distinguished 30-year career in banking with Bank of America, where his expertise and dedication made a lasting impact. In addition to his professional accomplishments, he brought a sense of humor to his social interactions and frequently had witty anecdotes to share with those he met.

He found joy in his family and was actively involved with his sons' interests in youth sports, memorabilia collecting, and local teams. As a grandfather, he provided impeccably reliable transportation and consistent attendance at games, performances, celebrations and milestones.

Barrett and Mary spent many retirement years in Sequim, enjoying the slower pace of life in the countryside. He golfed regularly at Sand Point Country Club, and two trophies confirm two holes-in-one. On an annual basis, he would venture to Oregon to play in the Black Butte Invitational with his lifelong college friends.

Barrett is survived by his wife of 62 years, Mary Worthington, his sons Todd (Lynette), and Kent (Stephanie), two grandsons, Riley and Quinn Worthington, and granddaughter Amelia Grace Worthington. He also leaves his brother Steve, his niece and nephew, Stephanie Strozyk and Ryan Worthington, along with their children and many cousins.

Barrett lived a wonderful and courageous life coping with Bi-Polar Disorder for 40 years. He spent the last 12 years living at Mirabella Seattle, struggling with the onset of Parkinson's. The family wishes to express their gratitude to the Health Care Staff for their devoted care over the past many years.

Barrett Worthington will be remembered for his steadfast commitment to his family, his community and his profession. His legacy lives on through his children, grandchildren, and all who had the privilege of knowing him.
